WATER & SEWER

Route 55 water tank was cleaned and inspected on Tuesday July 28, with the divers from Underwater Solutions. We are awaiting the final report, but early findings show no major problems inside this tank.

The July Loomis consent list has been completed and submitted to the DEC. This dept. has been moving forward on the rest of the violations listed by the DEC so that early completion can be done before the two upcoming water main jobs, and sewer plant projects get put at the top of the list.

Due to the ongoing I & I work in Loomis Sewer District, the July average has been around 27,000 gallons per day. With the large rainfall events this month, the highest daily flow was 74,000 on the first day of the month. I have sent updated, completed work forms with this report.

Water usage for the month of July seems to be down this year, running around 650,000 per day production. The primary water source has been the Sherwood & Roth wells, with the daily run time of 22.5 hours run per day. Well recharge "off" time has been running approximately 2 ½ to 3 hours per day.

Sewer production at the Swan Lake Sewer Plant seems to also be down from last year. The plant has been seeing flows that average around 325,000. Even with lower flows this month, handy wipes continue to plug up pumps, clarifiers, and recirculation flows that greatly affect the treatment process at the plant. Sludge production and control of continues to be the big challenge, with the first half of the month being wet and as of late, high humidity limiting drying on sand beds. TAM Enterprises again pulled 2 trailers of sludge out this month of 14,000 gallons of sludge.

In speaking with Earl and Delaware Engineering, EFC has made more money available for water & sewer projects. I would like to have Delaware Engineering work on a sewer grant for Loomis Sewer, which would be for 20% of our plant cost and a grant for Stevensville water for 60% for upgrade to the trunk line from the Stevensville wells to the Swan Lake storage tank location. This water main has been failing more and more and is the final section in the master plan for distribution of water to ALL of our water districts.

WHEREAS, the Town Board of the Town of Liberty (herein called the "Town"), in the County of Sullivan, New York, on behalf of the Ferndale Water District, in the Town (herein called the "District"), has caused Delaware Engineering, D.P.C., engineers duly licensed by the State of New York (the "Engineer"), to prepare a preliminary map, plan and report for the increase and improvement of facilities of the District, consisting of the installation of 4,400 linear feet of new watermain, including valves, hydrants, water

services, connections, site work and other related or ancillary work and engineering, legal and other costs; and said map, plan and report have been filed with the Town Board and the cost thereof has been estimated to be \$1,088,123, with \$376,123 of such cost expected to be paid from the capital reserve funds, and the \$712,000 balance to be financed by the issuance of bonds of the Town and WHEREAS, on July 6, 2015 the Town Board adopted an order describing in general terms the proposed increase and improvement of facilities, specifying the estimated cost thereof, and stating the Town Board would meet to hear all persons interested in said increase and improvement of facilities on August 3, 2015 at 3:50 o'clock P.M. (Prevailing Time) at the Town Hall, 120 North Main Street, Liberty, New York; and

WHEREAS, a Notice of such public hearing was duly published and posted pursuant to the provisions of Article 12 of the Town Law; and

WHEREAS, such public hearing was duly held by the Town Board on the 3rd day of August, 2015 at 3:50 o'clock P.M. (Prevailing Time) at the Town Hall, 120 North Main Street, Liberty, New York, with considerable discussion on the matter having been had and all persons desiring to be heard having been heard, including those in favor of and those in opposition to said increase and improvement of such facilities; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board, as lead agency, has given due consideration to the impact that the project described herein may have on the environment, and has determined that such project is a Type II project which will not result in any significant adverse environmental impacts, pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA), constituting Article 8 of the Environmental Conservation Law, and 6 N.Y.C.R.R.. Regulations Part 617:

Now, therefore, on the basis of the information given at such hearing, it is hereby DETERMINED, that it is in the public interest to increase and improve the facilities of the District as hereinabove described, at the estimated maximum cost of \$1,088,123, with \$376,123 of such cost expected to be paid from the capital reserve funds, and the \$712,000 balance to be financed by the issuance of bonds of the Town; and it is hereby

ORDERED, that the facilities of the District shall be so increased and improved and that the Engineer heretofore retained by the Town Board shall prepare plans and specifications and make a careful estimate of the expense for said increase and improvement of such facilities and, with the assistance of the Town Attorney, shall prepare a proposed contract for such increase and improvement of facilities of the District,

which plans and specifications, estimate and proposed contract shall be presented to the Town Board as soon as possible; and it is hereby

FURTHER ORDERED, that the expense of said increase and improvement of facilities shall be financed by the expenditure of \$376,123 of capital reserve funds to pay a part of said appropriation, and the issuance of \$712,000 bonds of the Town to finance the balance of said appropriation; and the costs of said increase and improvement of facilities, including payment of principal of and interest on said bonds, shall be paid by the assessment, levy and collection of assessments upon the several lots and parcels of land within the District in the same manner and at the same time as other Town charges; water rents have been imposed and it is expected that such rents shall continue to be imposed and collected and the amounts derived therefrom shall be budgeted and used to pay principal and interest on the bonds or notes issued; and it is hereby

FURTHER ORDERED, that the Town Clerk record, or cause to be recorded, a certified copy of this Resolution and Order After Public Hearing in the office of the Clerk of Sullivan County within ten (10) days after adoption thereof.

Recital

WHEREAS, following preparation of a map, plan and report and an estimate of cost for the increase and improvement of facilities of the Ferndale Water District (herein called the "District"), in the Town of Liberty (herein called the "Town"), in the County of Sullivan, New York, and after a public hearing duly called and held, the Town Board of the Town determined that it is in the public interest to increase and improve the facilities of the District, and ordered that such facilities be so increased and improved;

Now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED BY THE TOWN BOARD OF THE TOWN OF LIBERTY, IN THE COUNTY OF SULLIVAN, NEW YORK (by the favorable vote of not less than two-thirds of all the members of said Board) AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Town hereby appropriates the amount of \$1,088,123 for the increase and improvement of facilities of the District, consisting of the installation of 4,400 linear feet of new watermain, including valves, hydrants, water services, connections, site work and other related or ancillary work and engineering, legal and other costs. The estimated maximum cost thereof, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof, is \$1,088,123 and said amount is hereby appropriated for such purpose. The plan of financing includes the expenditure of \$376,123 of capital reserve funds to pay a part of said appropriation, and the issuance of bonds in the principal amount of \$712,000 to finance the balance of said appropriation and the assessment, levy and collection of assessments upon the several lots and parcels of land within the District in the same manner and at the same time as other Town charges.

Water rents have been imposed and it is expected that such rents shall continue to be imposed and collected and the amounts derived therefrom shall be budgeted and used to pay principal and interest on the bonds or notes issued.

Section 2. Bonds of the Town are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount of \$712,000 pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York (herein called "Law"), to finance a part of said appropriation.

Section 3. The following additional matters are hereby determined and stated:

- (a) The period of probable usefulness of the object or purpose for which said bonds are authorized to be issued, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 1 of the Law, is forty (40) years.
- (b) The proceeds of the bonds herein authorized and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of said bonds may be applied to reimburse the Town for expenditures incurred after the effective date of this resolution. The foregoing statement of intent with respect to reimbursement is made in conformity with Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2 of the United States Treasury Department.
- (c) The proposed maturity of the serial bonds authorized by this resolution will exceed five (5) years.

Section 4. Each of the bonds authorized by this resolution and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of said bonds shall contain the recital of validity prescribed by Section 52.00 of the Law and said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation said bonds shall be general obligations of the Town, payable as to both principal and interest by a general tax upon all the taxable real property within the Town without limitation as to rate or amount. The faith and credit of the Town are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, and provision shall be made annually in the budget of the Town by appropriation for (a) the amortization and redemption of the bonds and any notes issued in anticipation thereof to mature in such year and (b) the payment of interest to be due and payable in such year.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of this resolution and of the Law and pursuant to the provisions of Section 21.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bonds with substantially level or declining annual debt service, Section 30.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bond anticipation notes and Section 50.00 and Sections 56.00 to 60.00 and 168.00 of the Law, the powers and duties of the Town Board relative to authorizing bond anticipation notes and prescribing the terms, form and contents and as to the sale and issuance of the bonds herein authorized, and the renewals of said bond

anticipation notes, and relative to executing contracts for credit enhancements and providing for

substantially level or declining annual debt service, are hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal

officer of the Town.

Section 6. The validity of the bonds authorized by this resolution, and of any notes issued in

anticipation of said bonds, may be contested only if:

(a) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the Town is not

authorized to expend money, or

(b) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of such

resolution, or a summary thereof, are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding

contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

(c) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the constitution.

Section 7. This resolution shall take effect immediately and the Town Clerk is hereby authorized

and directed to publish the foregoing bond resolution, in summary, in "The Sullivan County Democrat," a

newspaper having general circulation in said Town, which newspaper is hereby designated as the official

newspaper of the Town for such publication, together with the Town Clerk's statutory notice in the form

prescribed by Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law of the State of New York.
